FACT-FINDING & HUMAN RIGHTS MONITORING

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COURSE OVERVIEW

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The overall purpose of this course is to empower participants with the capacity to document, monitor and act on the results regarding human rights and civil liberty violations in Barbados to better protect the rights of groups which have traditionally faced violations of their rights and have been limited in the fulfillment of their capacities.

This course entitled Monitoring and Documenting Human Rights Violations in Barbados is designed with the following goals:

1) to enable participants to identify relevant sources of law which provide the legal framework for civil and human rights violations including local laws - the Constitution, the Employment Rights Act, and international legal frameworks which Barbados has ratified including the Inter-American Convention on Human Rights, the Convention on the Rights of the Child, the Convention to end all forms of Discrimination against Women amongst others.

2) to enable participants to understand the ethical principles which underline the fact-finding and monitoring process particularly when addressing vulnerable communities

3) to provide participants with a practical approach to the documentation of human rights and civil rights violations through interactive exercises; building and consolidating competences over the duration of the workshop.

4) to provide information on techniques for human rights monitoring and to encourage the development of relevant skills for individuals working with vulnerable communities.

5) to enable the effective reporting of the results of human rights monitoring and fact-finding and the potential uses of reporting and monitoring in advocacy and policy engagement.

- 3) Challenging Police Action through the Police Complaints Authorities

The objective of Day 1 of the Course is to provide the foundation for participants to understand the nature of human rights and obligations which the State and private entities are required by law to provide for vulnerable communities. SESSION 1- INTRODUCTION

Teaching Component: Contact Building

SESSION 3: FACT-FINDING/INVESTIGATION? IN SEARCH OF....

In this session participants will be guided to achieve the following objectives:

1) develop an understanding of the monitoring process

2) develop an understanding of the investigating process as a subset of monitoring including the development of a Monitoring Protocol

3) develop an understanding of the ethical principles involved in investigation of human rights including how to address conflicting principles

LECTURE: ETHICAL PRINCIPLES [30 MINS], INTERVIEWING BASIC [20 MINUTES] WHAT DO YOU DO? INTERACTIVE EXERCISE

SESSION 4- IN SEARCH OF... THE INTERVIEW!

LECTURE: RIGHTS WHEN DEALING WITH THE POLICE [20 MINUTES]

In this session, participants will be guided in the basic tents of good interviewing skills. The process of the interview from contextual background research, the identification of witnesses, dealing with witnesses with trauma inter alia will be addressed. Participants will utilize this skills with respect to addressing violations by agents of the State such as police. Participants will be guided with respect to the constitutional rights of citizens when engaging with the police and applicable steps for redress. How do we bring a Constitutional action against the police for example?

ANALYSIS EXERCISE: JEREMY [50 MINUTES]

SESSION 5 - SITUATION MONITORING

In this session, participants will be guided in understanding the law in relation to employment including appropriate remedies based on the common law and the Employment Rights. Participants will be engaged with regards to:

- the legal obligations of the employer
- Wrongful and unfair dismissal
- Harassment in the Workplace
- Remedies
- The limits of case monitoring: Situation Monitoring/Compiling Reports

LECTURE 30 minutes: Employment Rights in Barbados

Activity Small Group Exercise: Mock Interview to gather data for a Situation Analysis of Employment and Vulnerable Groups in Barbados. Progressive Realization and the case of Disabilities in Barbados. What are the international obligations? What are the Applicable Standards? Where are they located? Has the state been progressively realizing the right?

SESSION 6- FURTHER MONITORING AND FOLLOW-UP

• In this session participants will be guided in the law in relation to private individuals and access to housing. The laws regarding landlord and tenant will be the basis of this presentation.

• In this session participants will be guided in additional tools which can be used to monitor both private and public bodies including the media.

SESSION 7 - MAKING SENSE OF IT ALL

In this session, participants will be guided in the process surrounding data analysis and given a brief introduction to the process of Report writing. How do we make data make sense? How do we present data? In this session participants will be guided in the Process for Analysis of Data.

Exercise: Participants will be given Raw Data to Analyze regarding the Provision of Medical and other Essential Services and guided through the process of analyzing the legal obligations and matching the data against these standards with a view to detecting patterns and trends , addressing conflicting findings and Drawing Conclusions.

SESSION 8-DOCUMENTING AND INTERNATIONAL REMEDIES

In this session, participants will examine the international forums which can be utilized in advocacy and for redress to address violations of human rights as applicable to Barbados. Participants will be guided in an examination of the procedures of Reporting Bodies such as United Nations Human Rights Committee and the Inter-American Commission.

Participants will examine the Jamaica Shadow Report [2016] to consolidate the approaches to monitoring and fact-finding and the requirements of report writing. Participants through this exercise will develop and strengthen their competences in report-writing. This session will be in the format of a 30 minute interactive presentation followed by the group exercise examining the Report.

SESSION 9 -

In this session, participants will think about future action. What do you do with the information you have collected, monitored and analyzed. Participants will be guided with regards to use of the data collected for advocacy. Participants will guided in the process of defining their advocacy goals and an advocacy strategy using data collected. The Types of Advocacy which are best suited for the various forms of data collected and presented will be the focus of this final session.
